Offshore Wind 2025: delivering clean energy through technology and collaboration

On 17th and 18th June at London's Excel centre, RenewableUK is bringing the offshore wind sector and its global supply chain together for Global Offshore Wind 2025 to focus on delivering our ambitious missions for clean energy; from the UK's drive to become a clean energy superpower, to the global drive to achieve net zero. In this year's theme Mission: Possible, the programme will outline the steps the offshore wind sector must take to reach deployment goals for 2030 and beyond.

This session aims to set the scene, outlining where we are and where the industry needs to get to for 2030.

Offshore wind: the industry's role in clean power goals

The UK has a goal to reach clean power by 2030, in less than five years' time. By this date, 95% of the UK's electricity should come from clean sources, a stretching but possible target, which will require an acceleration of offshore wind deployment. To set the wheels in motion, the UK has established new bodies, among them Great British Energy and the National Energy System Operator (NESO), while working with established institutions like The Crown Estate. But growing the sector is not just about the UK; offshore wind projects need international collaboration to move forward.

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To provide attendees with the context to understand the ever-changing landscape, the conference will open with a series of presentations from experts from leading energy and infrastructure institutions, representing both the UK and global picture. They will outline their progress and offer a forward-looking view of the years to come.

Global markets

With cost pressures and uncertainty facing the industry, the conference this year will explore how to keep the investment in offshore wind and renewable energy flowing. Whether you're an investment fund, an established developer or a supply chain company looking for routes to market, the conference will help you navigate the energy transition and stay resilient in evolving times.

However, being established doesn't mean there's no need to keep moving. The sector is very much in delivery mode when it comes to building projects and expanding capacity, with a need to accelerate and industrialise to meet demands.

At Global Offshore Wind 2025, there are several sessions on just how we can ensure the sector is up to the challenges ahead. From building on the recommendations of the Industrial Growth Plan, to embedding

Floating wind: the opportunity of the century

Floating wind is key to unlocking the potential of offshore wind in deeper waters further from shore. While the UK is blessed with a shallow coastline for fixed-bottom offshore wind, many regions around the world will need floating turbines to reap the benefits of offshore wind.

Last year was a big year for floating offshore wind in the UK. We saw the publication of the UK's Floating Offshore Wind Taskforce report, and Greenvolt in Scotland, the world's first large scale grid-connected floating wind farm, secure a CfD. Global Offshore Wind 2025 will dive deeper into what the sector needs to do to unlock the 'industrial opportunity of the century', reduce costs and ensure we have the supply chain and technical skills necessary to build more of these cutting-edge projects.

A vibrant exhibition space accessible to all at London Excel

The event is not just about conference sessions; it's also the perfect place to make new connections. The exhibition space is an opportunity to network with innovative global companies. Sold out since December last year, the exhibition hall will span a record 13,000 square metres, hosting around 200 organisations. Side events and networking

Outside of the main conference, Global Offshore Wind 2025 will feature side events and workshops, typically at breakfast, lunch or towards the end of the day.

Side events allow for a more informal and conversational exploration of ideas touched upon in the main programme. Dedicated side events include a drop-in on supply chain funding opportunities, securing bankability of engineering, procurement and construction contracts and an informative session on building the Dogger Bank Wind farm HVDC substation.

Of particular note this year is a focus on reaching out to the industry's newer entrants. The newcomer's breakfast side event is a chance for those transitioning to the renewables industry or at the start of their careers to meet members of the RenewableUK Shadow Board face-to-face.



Meanwhile, RenewableUK has partnered with a local school, Bobby Moore Academy, to host a young people's engagement session to inspire the next generation.

While the event covers important issues with serious and lively discussion, it's also an opportunity to have fun! The official welcome reception and exhibitors' drinks are open to all and are a chance to relax and enjoy more light-hearted conversation with other delegates.
